Biden will decide fate for archery, hunters' safety programs in schools

In early August, conservation and shooting sports organizations learned of an improper interpretation of the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act (BSCA) that prevented schools from receiving federal funding if they have archery or hunter safety programs.

Knowing how important these programs are to childhood maturation and safety, conservation nonprofits across the country immediately called for a reinterpretation.

MUCC and other conservation stakeholders nationwide sent a letter to Department of Education Secretary Cardona urging a re-issuance of guidance. The letter was also sent to the entire Michigan congressional delegation urging a permanent fix to the problem.

On Tuesday, the United States House of Representatives voted 424-1 to fix the misinterpreted language within the BSCA, followed Wednesday by a unanimous vote in the Senate. The new language now heads to the President's desk for approval.

"These programs teach life-long skills and are critical to engaging youth in our outdoor heritage, and tens of thousands of kids benefit from them, grow through them and take away confidence and personal responsibility," Trotter said. "Congress overwhelmingly agrees with this assessment, and these vital programs will now continue to operate in our schools. We appreciate their swift and decisive action to fix this."

On Wednesday, September 12, a group of students, faculty, staff, and alumni volunteers gathered outside the Davidson Building on Kellogg Community College's (KCC) Battle Creek campus to join On the Ground in creating important pollinator habitat. After just a couple hours of work, volunteers planted and mulched an 80-foot garden bed just outside the entrance to the campus building, habitat for pollinators like songbirds, butterflies, and bumble bees.

Some of the native species that were planted include bee balm, black-eyed Susan, columbine, milkweed, goldenrod, spicebush, and nannyberry. Volunteers also spread 20 cubic yards of natural hardwood mulch throughout the garden.

The partnership between MUCC and KCC was sparked after each organization (along with Battle Creek's Willard Library) received generous donations from the estate of late KCC professor and conservationist, Dean Barnum. At this event, we celebrated the life and legacy of Dean and took this opportunity to improve habitat while beautifying this spot on campus. Thank you to all of the wonderful volunteers who spent the morning with us improving pollinator habitat on campus.

I got a chance to participate in this project. It was a step back in time for me because I attended KCC back in the late 60 and early 70's when Mr. Barnum was there and before I went to WMU. I vaguely remember Dean Barnum but have learned to respect his legacy that he left for the love of the outdoors and education. I know at MUCC we are very grateful for this generous donation of 1 Million Dollars. Dean was a true conservation-ists and enjoyed participating in Michigan's Outdoor Heritage.

Recap of September NRC Meeting

September's Natural Resource Commission meeting was the first for new director Scott Bowen.

Bowen introduced himself to those in attendance, highlighting his experience at other state agencies, stating that the DNR will by far be the most interesting.

Commissioner Dave Nyberg spoke on a fisheries amendment related to steelhead he is working on and intends to provide language at the October NRC meeting in Escanaba.

Nyberg said his amendment would change steelhead regulations along the lines of his 2021 amendment. No draft language was proposed at this time, but he did provide a statement to the commission.

NRC Chair Tom Baird announced that beginning in 2024, there will be a deer workgroup convened for a pair of meetings to discuss longer-term deer management in the state. The group will be composed of traditional stakeholders, agricultural interests and the public.

Commissioners adopted four warmwater fisheries order amendments. More information on each order can be found in MUCC's August preview HERE. https://mucc.org/august-nrc-preview-2/

Commissioner Dave Cozad provided an amendment to Fisheries Order 206.23A. The Cozad Amendment would add four additional lakes to the list of lakes with a pike slot limit. The commission tabled the amendment and proposal until the October meeting for the public to have time to review the amendment.

Up for information this month was a number of cold water regulations. These proposed orders are available for action by the commission in October. More details on the orders can be found in MUCC's preview of the September meeting HERE. https://mucc.org/september-nrc-preview-2/

Preceding the meeting of the whole, MUCC presented the results of its 2023 Annual Convention to commissioners. The presentation highlighted the resolutions that passed within or adjacent to the NRC's purview. MUCC Vice President Rob Miller sat in on the presentation alongside MUCC staff.

Dr. Seth Herbst presented to the fisheries committee on Michigan steelhead management, highlighting ongoing research and complications surrounding managing the species.

The October meeting is on Thursday, October 12, at Bay College in Escanaba. At the meeting the DNR will present a long-awaited decision related to wolf management should the state regain management following a federal delisting of wolves.

MUCC will be on hand to stream the meeting as technology allows.

Michigan Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus Advisory Council

Formed in 2015 the Michigan Legislative Sportsman's Caucus Advisory Council was established to advance Michigan's outdoor heritage through science-based wildlife and fisheries management and the wise use of our state's natural resources, and to protect and advance the rights and traditions of Michigan citizens to hunt, fish recreationally shoot and trap by engaging in an open dialogue with the Michigan Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus

In this role, the Advisory Council interacts with the Caucus by:

Assisting in the facilitation of meetings and events between the sportsman's community and the Caucus, including fundraising to cover events costs and administrative needs of the Council;

Assisting Caucus leadership in the development of Caucus priority policy issues as well as providing briefing materials on pertinent legislation;

Assisting Caucus leadership in the development of legislative strategy including rallying grassroots support, and;

Serving as the informational link to the hunting, angling recreational shooting and trapping community on activities of the Caucus.

DNR Fish Report: Lake Michigan SW Mich. Region 7 for late September

Southwest Lower Peninsula

Muskegon: Boat anglers trolling for salmon found the action to be slow. A few immature salmon were caught 60 to 120 feet down in 100 to 175 feet of water. Using a white paddle with green or white flies was the bait of choice among anglers.

Grand Haven: Salmon action was slow for boat anglers. A few immature salmon were caught 75 to 120 feet down in 120 to 200 feet of water. Pier anglers also found the salmon action to be slow. A couple were caught early in the morning while casting glow spoons. Anglers reported that glow spoons and white paddle/flies worked well for salmon.

St. Joseph: Boat anglers reported that salmon fishing was on the slow side. There were a few fish caught in well past 100 feet of water, but overall, it was slow. Pier fishing was slow for all species, but fishing pressure was very low as well. Perch anglers caught a few. The fish were reported to be very deep and scattered. Anglers were fishing from 50 to almost 80 feet of water. Anglers did report catching salmon in the lower St. Joseph River and at the Berrien Springs Dam.

South Haven: Salmon anglers had slow fishing; however, there were a few fish caught in around 110 feet of water. Pier fishing was slow for all species. Fishing pressure for perch was low, but those who made it out reported slow fishing. Anglers fishing the Black River for salmon also had very slow fishing.

Have A Safe Month

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This issue's receipt is from Fred Trost's Fish & Wild Game Classics 1989 /Lois Bohn, Sebewaing Mi.

1 1/2 Goose breast's skinned & ground up 6 Tablespoons bottled Italian dressing 1/2 teaspoon course ground pepper 1 cup flour / 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt Olive Oil, (2) 4 oz cans mushrooms 2Large onions Cheese, 1pkg Hemberger buns



Grind Goose breast with finest blade you have—it should look like hamburger. Add Italian dressing and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Let stand at least 1 hour or even overnight in fridge. Miz together the flour, remaining pepper, garlic powder, and seasoned salt. Spread on wax paper/ Form goose burger into a ball large enough for one patty. Flatten on flour mixture to form patty and drench. Flip over and do other side. Form rest of goose burger into patties. Fry patties in only enough olive oil to coat pan. Do not over fry . While burgers are frying sauté onions in 1 Tablespoon butter until transparent. Add mushrooms mixture and cheese. (Makes 8-10 burgers. Chef's comments: I've used ground turkey, duck, rabbit and squirrel . Enjoy.
